Fees

Government policy requires disclosure of fees paid to members of statutory boards and committees. The daily fee paid to committee members during 2015 was \$400 for members and \$550 for the chairperson.

Animal ethics committees

NAEAC sees its function of providing information and advice to AECs as important in promoting good decision-making. Apart from responding to requests for advice, activities in this area in 2015 included:

- AEC visits Once a year, NAEAC visits AECs in a region of the country. In 2015, those visits were made in the Palmerston North region and included:
 - Massey University;
 - AgResearch Grasslands; and
 - Estendart Ltd.

Where and when possible, NAEAC members also attend AEC meetings in their area.

• AEC newsletters – Two newsletters from the Chair were sent out during 2015, including advice on issues that had been raised during the year.

Issues for the year

- Three codes of ethical conduct were reviewed during the year.
- Animal Welfare Act 1999 review a NAEAC subcommittee was formed to assist MPI with issues relating to the changes to the animal welfare legislation.
- NAEAC published its 12th Occasional Paper in October: The blind leading the blind: animal facility staff and researchers working together to reduce bias in animal research. This paper was presented at the 2014 ANZCCART Conference, and was published with ANZCCART's permission.
- Mini-tutorials held to expand members' understanding of issues arising from research, testing and teaching using animals included:
 - The sentience of fish (Professor Peter Davie, Massey University)
 - Computer-aided learning resources (Neil Ward, Massey University)
 - Pursuing good science: animal welfare training for university students (Bridget Brox, Victoria University).

NAEAC awards

- The 2015 NAEAC Three Rs award, sponsored by the Royal New Zealand SPCA, was presented to Neil Ward of Massey University for his development of computer-aided learning resources. These resources resulted in a drop in the number of animals used in Massey's physiology classes from 600 to just one.
- An AEC Service award, as well as a letter of commendation from NAEAC, were presented to Bridget Brox, a PhD student studying psychology at Victoria University. Bridget developed a training module for students using animals at the university.
