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Introduction

This introduction is not part of the Animal Products Notice, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

Purpose

The purpose of this document is to set out the zoosanitary requirements necessary to export compliant canine and feline semen from New Zealand to Great Britain.

Background

The Animal Products Act 1999 provides the controls and mechanisms needed to give and to safeguard official assurances or zoosanitary certificates to facilitate the entry of animal material including live animals, hatching eggs, semen and embryos, and products into overseas markets.

Notices issued as Overseas Market Access Requirements (OMARs) under section 60(1)(a) and (b) of the Animal Products Act specify the requirements that are necessary or desirable for the purpose of facilitating access to overseas markets or are in accordance with the requirements of the relevant authority of the importing country.

OMARs may also determine the form and content of the official assurances that can be issued for animal material or product, including live animals, hatching eggs, semen or embryos, which meet the specified requirements.

Where the OMAR determines the form and content of the official assurances, a separate export certificate template is available to authorised persons, recognised persons and registered exporters who have applied for access to the certificate templates, to facilitate the completion and issuing of the relevant official assurance. That template will be an amendable version of the form set in the OMAR.

Notices issued under section 60(1)(c) of the Animal Products Act to safeguard the assurances provided by New Zealand, and guidance in the form of Operational Codes, should be read in conjunction with this Notice.

This OMAR specifies the requirements that must be met by exporters of canine and feline semen to be exported from New Zealand to Great Britain and determines the form and content of the official assurance that must accompany the canine and feline semen to be exported. The OMAR was issued after consultation with industry and Great Britain. It is based on the *Import of Canine and Feline Semen Import Information Note* (INN) CFS/1, dated May 2022, for the General license, to import canine or feline semen from donors that are compliant with the conditions in *Retained EU Regulation* 576/2013.

Who should read this Animal Products Notice?

Exporters of canine and feline semen to Great Britain.

Why is this important?

This Notice is important because it sets out the requirements that need to be met so that the Director-General of the New Zealand Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) can certify that the canine and feline semen meet the requirements for export to Great Britain which New Zealand, in consultation with the government of Great Britain, has determined will apply. It should be noted that although the canine and feline semen may comply with these requirements and be given an official assurance (by way of a certificate), the importing country ultimately retains control over what canine and feline semen it clears for entry.

Other information

Export non-conformances

Exporters should note that, under section 51 of the Animal Products Act 1999, where they have exported animal material or products, including live animals, hatching eggs, semen and embryos, that are refused entry by the foreign government they have a statutory duty to notify the Director-General of MPI not later than 24 hours after they have first knowledge of the event.

Liability

Section 61A of the Animal Products Act 1999 states that:

The Crown is not liable, and nor is the Director-General or any employee of the Ministry liable, for any loss arising through the refusal or failure of the relevant authority of an overseas market to admit export animal material or animal product to that market.

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Part 1: Requirements

1.1 Application

- (1) This Notice applies to the export of canine and feline semen which has been issued with the *General Import Licence* to import canine or feline semen from donors that are compliant with the conditions in *Retained EU Regulation* 576/2013, from New Zealand to Great Britain.
- (2) Semen prepared under the *Specific License* to import canine or feline semen into Great Britain from donors that are not compliant with the conditions in *Retained EU Regulation* 576/2013 are unable to export using this Animal Products Notice.
- (3) Great Britain being:
 - a) England, Wales and Scotland
 - b) The Channel Islands
 - c) Isle of Man
- (4) Northern Ireland is not part of Great Britain and under the Brexit Northern Ireland Protocol, Northern Ireland continues to apply European Union law and European Union requirements.
 - Exports of canine and feline semen to Northern Ireland are not included in this Animal Products Notice.

1.2 Definitions

- (1) In this Notice, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - Act means the Animal Products Act 1999
- (2) A term used in this Notice that is defined in the Act or the following Notices (or their successors) has the meaning given to it in the Act or that Notice:
 - a) <u>Animal Products Notice: Official Assurances Specifications for Animal Material and Animal Products.</u>

1.3 Requirements for export

- (1) Canine and feline semen exported from New Zealand to Great Britain must be accompanied by an official assurance in the form of a zoosanitary certificate, a sample version of which is included in Part 2.
- (2) A zoosanitary certificate must be completed and issued by an authorised person.
- (3) In order to issue a zoosanitary certificate, the authorised person must be satisfied that:
 - A license to import the canine and feline semen has been issued by the competent authority of Great Britain.
 - b) The donor animal must be permanently identifiable by a transponder.
 - c) Immediately before the first collection of semen, the donor animal must be scanned for its microchip to check that the number on the microchip complies with the records held for the animal by the veterinary surgeon.
 - d) The premises where the semen is collected, processed and stored must be registered with the Ministry for Primary Industries.
 - e) The proposed shipment otherwise meets the requirements of this Notice.

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1.4 Specific Requirements for the zoosanitary certificate

- (1) The donor animal must have been identified with a transponder or a clearly readable tattoo before it can be vaccinated against rabies.
- (2) The semen must be consigned in sealed ampoules or straws; each ampoule or straw must be permanently identified and the identification mark of each noted on the export certificate.
- (3) The sealed ampoules or straws must be kept in a container which is unused or sterile and which does not contain other semen that does not meet the same standards.
