## **2. Korea Requirements**

Wallabies exported from New Zealand to Korea must comply with the import requirements of Korea listed in this notice as follows:

- 2.1 An official veterinarian of New Zealand must certify the following:
  - 2.1.1 No case of rabies has ever occurred in New Zealand.
  - 2.1.2 The animals have been captive bred in New Zealand.
  - 2.1.3 The animals have been examined 24 hours prior to the scheduled date of shipment and were found to be fit and healthy to travel, free from ectoparasites and free from infectious and contagious disease at the time of export.

### **3. Definitions**

For the purposes of this document:

Any term or expression that is defined in the Animal Products Act 1999 and used, but not defined in this document, has the same meaning as in this Act.

#### *Explanatory note*

*This OMAR is based the export certificate wallabies to Korea, which is drafted in accordance with Korea's Livestock Epidemic Prevention Law.*

An import permit is not required, however National Veterinary Research and Quarantine Service of Korea should be notified in advance of any import.

Please note that, although Korea may have no specific import conditions for Wallabies, all live animals must be accompanied by official Government certification in accordance with Korea's Livestock Epidemic Prevention Law.
