1. Statutory authority

Pursuant to section 60, section 60A, section 62(1) and section 167 of the Animal Products Act 1999 I notify the following:

(iii) the determination under section 62(1) of the format and content of the official assurance for bovine semen to Papua New Guinea.

2. Papua New Guinea requirements

Bovine semen exported from New Zealand to Papua New Guinea must be accompanied by an official assurance in the form of a completed zoosanitary certificate.

The zoosanitary certificate as specified below must be completed and certified, after due enquiry, by an Official Veterinarian of the Ministry for Primary Industries.

Explanatory note:

If the zoosanitary certificate is not certified then the bovine semen does not satisfy the conditions in the notice. Likewise, if the bovine semen does not satisfy the zoosanitary requirements in the certificate, then the certificate will not be certified.

IV: SANITARY INFORMATION

VETERINARY CERTIFICATE

I, an Official Veterinarian authorised by the New Zealand Ministry for Primary Industries certify, after due enquiry, in regard to the animals and semen listed in this Export Certificate, that:

1. For the 6 month period immediately prior to the collection of semen for export to Papua New Guinea, New Zealand has been free from bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE), contagious bovine pleuropneumonia, foot and mouth disease, Jembrana disease, clinical Newcastle disease, theileriosis (except T. *orientalis*), rinderpest and vesicular stomatitis. Vaccination against these diseases is not permitted in New Zealand.

2. The semen collection centre has been approved by the New Zealand Ministry for Primary Industries for the collection and export of semen and is not under any quarantine restriction for any notifiable disease.

NOTES:	This certificate replaces the one dated 11 May 1993 and is based on conditions from Papua New Guinea dated 4 May 1993. The changes that have been made to this certificate are reformatting and minor editorial.

- 1. An Import Permit is required.
- 2. An Official Veterinarian means a veterinarian authorised by the Veterinary Administration of the country to perform animal health and/or public health inspections of commodities and, when appropriate, perform certification in conformity with the provisions of the chapter of the OIE *Code* pertaining to principles of certification. Veterinarians authorised or accredited under the Animal Products Act 1999 can be termed 'Official Veterinarians'.

Section 61A of the Animal Products Act 1999 states that 'The Crown is not liable, and nor is the Director-General or any employee of the Ministry liable, for any loss arising through the refusal or failure of the relevant authority of an overseas market to admit export animal material or animal product to that market'.
